- C1 States, Tribes, Countries – a Three Jurisdiction Comparison CLE**
Different jurisdictions do things, well, differently. How do the various states handle jurisdiction to modify? How do the tribes work cases that require enforcement of a registered order from a U.S. state? Will foreign countries do paternity establishment upon request?
