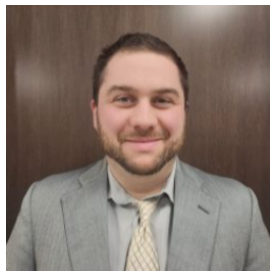

1A Early Emancipation

What to do when the child joins the military, gets married, has a child of their own, leaves home and is not under the control of either parent, incarceration of child, death of child, etc. Does your court order automatically abate for that child? Do you need to modify the order via the courts? Does it matter what the circumstances are for which avenue of early emancipation you follow?

2A Modification of Support – Incarceration

Modification can be a mine field and is such a large topic, this session will break it down and look at just one circumstance of when modifications are warranted. There are options that jurisdictions could have chosen to address what happens when the NCP is incarcerated for more than 6 months. Do you automatically modify the support order when you learn of the incarceration or just suspend the current support automatically instead of a full-blown modification? Do you set it for court once you find out about the incarceration? Or do you wait until one of the parties asks for the modification?

2B Emancipation – When There is More than One Child

Does the current support amount automatically reduce as each child emancipates? Does the enforcing state continue to collect the same amount and apply more towards the arrears? Does the order actually change or is it an in gross order? What happens when the last child emancipates? Do you wait until someone speaks up and just keep collecting at the CSUP + Arrears amount and apply everything to the arrears? Can all of this be done administratively or do you need to go through the courts to change the amount of the current support?

4B Change of Custody

This can be a muddled path to travel when a child goes from parent to a guardian. What happens to the current order? Do you automatically do a modification for change of payee, or do you end this order and establish a new one? Can this be done administratively or must it be done judicially. What happens to the former CP who is now an additional NCP? Can you administratively establish a new order for them to pay the guardian, or do you need to go through the courts? Does it matter if the original order can be modified administratively? Or is it necessary to establish this order via the courts. Can it all be combined in one action?

During that time, she concentrated on Intergovernmental Divisions, as well as overseeing the Access and Visitation Grant throughout the State of Illinois. As of October 31, 2018, she has added the supervision of Field Operations throughout the State. She is currently a board member for ERICSA.
